Mendocino County

Be transported to another world, where you'll find exactly what you've been missing.

undreds of miles of hiking trails, endless unspoiled beaches, verdant hills, and secluded lakes await you in Mendocino County. Here you can easily find solitude and beauty around every bend, and escape from the everyday grind of the outside world.

Mendocino County is also home to many one-of-a-kind experiences, beloved by visitors old and new. Whether it's the natural beauty and scenery of the newly designated Point Arena-Stornetta section of the California Coastal National Monument, giraffes galloping along the Pacific Ocean's edge, or a tree so large you can drive your car through it, every day brings a new discovery and new memories to last a lifetime.

Point Arena-Stornetta National Monument

The Point Arena-Stornetta California Coastal National Monument is an ideal place to view the sea rocks and islands that comprise one of California's most magical treasures. Hike more than 1,600 acres of craggy coastline, the estuary of the Garcia River and adjacent beach, and a small island only accessible at low tide.

Historic Point Arena Lighthouse is just to the north of the Monument, with Manchester State Park and its magnificent beach a few miles away. At low tide, Bowling Ball Beach reveals rows of rounded boulders sculpted by the tides and wind, lined up like rows of

bowling balls. This beautiful piece of the California coastline is the perfect place for a leisurely hike and picnic with unrivalled seal and whale watching from the bluffs.

The Skunk Train

All aboard! Journey on this historic 130-year-old rail line amongst towering old-growth redwood trees, over wooden trestle bridges, and through majestic stone tunnels. Lucky travelers might spot osprey, blue herons, and egrets as the train passes alongside the Pudding Creek Estuary, before diving into the redwood forest and seeing some of the tallest trees on the

planet. Trains depart from both Fort Bragg and Willits, so be sure to check the Skunk Train calendar while planning your trip.

If you're visiting during the holiday season, be sure not to miss a ride on the Christmas Train. Riders are treated to hot beverages served by elves, carolers making their way through the train, and a surprise visit from Santa!

Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens

Stroll through one of California's most beautiful seaside botanical gardens, and enjoy colorful splendor any time of year. The Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens in Fort Bragg is best known for its collection of tender species rhododendrons—fragrant, fragile rhododendrons that thrive only in the cloud forests of the Himalayas and a narrow band of the California coast.

Bird watchers also flock to the botanical gardens, which have become a haven to more than 150 species of birds—including rarities like the red-breasted nuthatch and ash-throated flycatcher.

B. Bryan Preserve

How many places in the world can you find a Greater Kudu backlit by the crashing waves of the Pacific Ocean? Or a Rothschild Giraffe with towering redwood trees in the background? As far as we know, only one! B. Bryan Preserve in Point Arena is a preserve for endangered African hoofstock, open by appointment for tours. While there, you'll have a chance to see all three species of zebra on the planet, kudu, antelope, and playful giraffes. If you're lucky, you might be able to feed a giraffe yourself—but watch their long blue tongues, they'll try to steal a kiss!

Montgomery Woods State Natural Reserve

On the winding Comptche Ukiah Road, which runs between Ukiah and the coast, is Montgomery Woods. The Reserve contains five magnificent groves of old-growth coastal redwoods. Hike on the park's many trails or picnic among these giants of the tree world. Follow Montgomery Creek on a three-mile loop tucked into a

little glen with banks that rise steeply and abruptly, cutting it off from the outside world and giving it a uniquely sheltered feel. The quiet isolation of the grove, combined with the strikingly lush vegetation, turns the area into a little paradise.

One distinction of the park is that between December 1996 and August 2000, the tallest tree in the world was located there. It was appropriately named the Mendocino Tree.

Ridgewood Ranch—Home of Seabiscuit


Just south of Willits sits the 5,000 acre Ridgewood Ranch, home and resting place of champion thoroughbred racehorse Seabiscuit. Dubbed the "small racehorse with a great heart," Seabiscuit was the international horse racing superstar known for his underdog win over War Admiral in 1938. Seabiscuit was later retired to Ridgewood Ranch where he sired over 100 foals.

The Seabiscuit Heritage Foundation leads tours of Seabiscuit's stud and mare barns, the historic Craftsman-style 1905 ranch house and introduces visitors to the champion's descendants, the "Lil' Biscuits." Tours are offered by reservation.

Confusion Hill

Since 1949, Confusion Hill has been astounding families with its mysterious attractions. Stand in the world-famous Gravity House, where everything begins to feel topsy-turvy and water flows uphill, marvel at the Ripley's Believe It Or Not World's Tallest Chainsaw Carving, and take a ride on a narrow-gauge miniature railroad through the redwoods to learn about the area's logging history.

Confusion Hill is a throwback to the golden age of American travel, and you'll feel like you're stepping back in time. An on-site gift shop provides unique souvenirs, including handcrafted redwood curios like small carvings, burls, and more.







Chandelier Drive-Thru Tree

Mendocino County is home to some of the tallest trees in the world—massive, ancient giants that reach more than three-hundred feet into the sky. There are many amazing ways to experience these immortals—hiking through protected groves, kayaking up tranquil estuaries lined on either side, and even riding an historic train. But one of the most unusual ways to get a feel for the immensity of the redwoods is found in the north of the county, just outside the town of Leggett and minutes from Confusion Hill.

The Chandelier Drive-Thru Tree was first carved in the 1930s, and has flourished ever since. The opening is large enough for most cars, and hundreds of visitors flock here every day to pass through the mouth of a living piece of history—a tree more than 2,400 years old.

City of 10,000 Buddhas

Just outside the City of Ukiah, the Gate of Three Arches welcomes visitors to the City of 10,000 Buddhas. Founded by Venerable Master Hua in 1974, the City has a monastic complex, schools, a university, and an extensive library of Buddhist texts.

After checking in at the front office, wander the grounds amidst brightly-plumed peacocks. Make sure to visit the Hall of 10,000 Buddhas, where thousands of tiny golden statues of the Buddha gaze down on meditating monks and nuns. For lunch, be sure to visit the vegetarian café on the premises. For those who want to delve more deeply into the experience, retreats are offered throughout the year.

Solar Living Institute

Where can you find a massive solar array, the largest freestanding cob structure, and a garden where trees grow through cars? The Solar Living Institute in Hopland, of course!

Since 1998 the Institute has been providing world-class education and hands-on experiences with all things sustainable. From photovoltaic, to people-powered energy, to alternative building structures and permaculture, the Solar Living Institute has it all. A self-guided tour is available, and is a great way to introduce kids to the science behind these world-changing technologies. Workshops are


also offered throughout the year, for kids and adults of all ages.

Glass Beach

Fort Bragg's Glass Beach is a treasure hunter's dream come true, a place where adults become children again, and children are overtaken by the joy of discovery. It is also a testament to the amazing transformative power of time and tide. Once a public dump, decades of waves have transformed the shards of broken glass into soft, luminescent sea glass. The 'sand' here sparkles with all the colors of the rainbow, and with no metal trash remaining, you can walk barefoot on what have become soft stones of glass.

The hunt is where the fun is, but visitors are encouraged not to take away the beauty—leaving the sea glass where it belongs ensures this manmade treasure will last for generations to come.

To learn more about Glass Beach, view unique glass and purchase locally made jewelry and crafts made from the glass, make sure to visit the Sea Glass Museum, which has the world's largest permanent sea glass exhibit, one mile south of Fort Bragg.





Bounty of the County

To truly experience Mendocino County, immerse yourself in the sights and culture. But don't forget —you've got to taste the county too.

ith its fertile valleys, fishing harbors, and a longtime commitment to organic and sustainable farming practices, Mendocino County has emerged as a leading destination for culinary travelers, having long promoted the farm-to-table lifestyle. The county is home to an amazing 3,000 varieties of mushrooms, and Oprah Winfrey's *O, The Oprah Magazine* named November's Mushroom, Wine & Beer Festival one of its top six food festivals. *Coastal Living* magazine crowned January's Crab, Wine & Beer Festival one of the country's top ten seafood and wine festivals.

Speaking of wines, the county's 10 appellations—including Cole Ranch, the smallest appellation in North America—and 90+ wineries allow visitors to experience a multitude of wines and winemaking styles. World-class wineries and tasting rooms can be found along the Redwood Corridor, from Hopland to Dos Rios, and the Highway 128 Wine Road, from Yorkville to Philo.

When it comes to culinary pursuits, Mendocino County has found itself leading the way. Long before craft beers came into vogue, the county was home to leading artisan breweries—including the first brewpub in California to open after Prohibition! County residents lived the locavore life even before the term existed, and you'll find the freshest fruits and vegetables at stands around the county and at the many farmers' markets.

Authenticity in a Glass

Mendocino's reputation as a wine region grows by leaps and bounds each year. Once noted for selling the majority of its grapes to other wine areas, the county now produces some of the top wines in the country.

In 2014, wines and winemakers from the county claimed six spots in the San Francisco Chronicle's acclaimed Top 100 Wines list. And Decanter magazine's Stephen Brook called Anderson Valley, "[a]n oasis from Napa's glitz and glamour, this is the wine region with... excellent Pinot Noir."

The county is home to the first certified organic winery in the country, and has an overall commitment to sustainability. Almost 30% of Mendocino County's wine grapes are certified organic or biodynamic—substantially higher than any other region in the United States. In fact, one-third of the total organic wine grape acreage in California is in Mendocino County.


While the number of wineries and Mendocino County's prominence in the world of wine continue to grow, one thing hasn't changed. You'll often get to meet the actual winemakers doing the pouring in tasting rooms, which means you'll get to hear their stories (there are always stories!) while learning about local wines from the people who know them best.

Tastes of the Wine Country

Redwood Corridor

The hub of an active wine region, Hopland is the first stop in Mendocino County when arriving from the south on Highway 101. Even though its population is only about 800 people, Hopland boasts over a dozen wineries and tasting rooms.

Downtown Hopland is home to familyowned gems like Cesar Toxqui Cellars, Milano Winery, Campovida, and McNab Ridge Winery. Or visit the Frey **Vineyards** wine tasting bar at the Solar Living Institute's Real Goods Store. Frey was the first maker of certified biodynamic and organic wines in the U.S. For a one-stop tasting of regional wines look no





further than **Sip! Mendocino**. Sip! carries about 100 Mendocino County wines, with over a dozen to sample daily, including hard-to-find labels like Black Kite Cellars.

John Fetzer's 600-acre Saracina Vineyards includes an on-site organic farm, 300 acres of hand-tended vines, and a state-of-the-art wine cave system. Carved out of solid rock, these are the first wine caves in Mendocino County, and a tour is a highlight of any trip.

Nearby Jaxon Keys Winery and Nelson Family Vineyards are both winning awards and recognition for their offerings.

Just north of Hopland sits Ukiah, a place that hasn't lost its small-town soul yet is now a source for big town flavor found in its locally crafted wine and beer. Ukiah is home to Parducci Wine Cellars, the world's first carbon-neutral winery, thanks to the use of biodiesel in its machinery, organic growing practices, and tree-free papers and soy inks. Winemaker Victor Simon, who learned the craft from his grandfather, creates the organic, single vineyard varietals at Simaine Cellars.

North of Ukiah, Redwood Valley is a distinctive Mendocino County wine region. It's home to several wineries, including Barra of Mendocino, which has an architecturally distinctive tasting room as well as gardens and a picnic area, and Testa Ranch with its tasting room overlooking 25 acres of vineyards which have been in the family for five generations.

Highway 128 Wine Road

Drive fifteen serpentine miles west from Cloverdale on Highway 128, and you're in the picturesque Yorkville Highlands, an appellation consisting of approximately 40,000 acres straddling Highway 128. The area is home to three tasting rooms open to the public, as well as some by prior appointment.

Yorkville, a tiny dot on the map, is home to Yorkville Cellars, a small family-run winery growing organic grapes. It is the only known winery that grows all eight of the main Bordeaux grapes and then bottles each individually as a varietal each vintage. One of the first designated organic vineyards in California, Yorkville Cellars helped establish the county's reputation as a center for sustainable winemaking practices. A couple of miles farther west is Artevino/Maple Creek Winery where Tom Rodrigues grows Chardonnay, Merlot and Symphony grapes on his 180-acre ranch. Stop in at the tasting room, which lies at the top of a winding road, where Tom's art adorns the walls as well as the labels on the bottles. The third stop in the Highlands is Meyer Family Cellars, another family-run operation that, in addition to a wide variety of award-winning wines, offers a picnic area, bocce and children's playground.

Known for its folk language, Boontling, Boonville is a great place to get out of the car, relax, and explore.

Nine Hop Stops

Mendocino County loves beer; do you? If so, there are plenty of choices—from the first organic brewpub in the nation, to some of the early pioneers of the microbrew movement, to fantastic pubs and pizzerias with world-class beer lists. Drink up!

Anderson Valley Brewing Company

For the bahlest (that's "best" to you Brightlighters!) brews in town, head to the Tap Room at the Anderson Valley Brewing Company in Boonville. Founded in 1987, the Tap Room has beers you won't find outside of the brewery and, if you listen closely, you just might hear some locals harpin' Boontling. Take a tour of the brewery with its massive copper brew kettles or if you're feeling energetic, take your beer outside for a round or two of disc golf.

North Coast Brewing Company

A pioneer in the craft beer movement, North Coast Brewing Company opened in 1988 as a local brewpub in the historic town of Fort Bragg, on the Mendocino coast. In addition to Red Seal Ale, Old Rasputin Russian Imperial Stout and Scrimshaw Pilsner, the brewery has resurrected the old Acme label with a heritage dating back to San Francisco in the 1860s.

Visit the Tap Room for fine, balanced food and beer pairings, and catch some dinner jazz in the Sequoia Room.

Mendocino Brewing Company

The Hopland Brewery was the first brewpub opened in California (2nd in the U.S.) after the repeal of Prohibition in 1933. It didn't take long for the Hopland Brewery to become a landmark and a point of pilgrimage on famed California Highway 101 ("take the Golden Gate Bridge, go north for 2 hours and the brewery is on the right"). By the 1990s, the brewery desperately needed to expand and so built a new brewery, the Mendocino Brewing Company, about 12 miles north in Ukiah, where you can taste your way through Mendocino Brewing Company's world famous beers.

Ukiah Brewing Company

Mendocino County is full of "firsts" and we count among them the Ukiah Brewing Company, which holds the distinction of having been the very first certified organic brewpub and the second certified organic



restaurant in the United States when it opened in 2000. Located in the heart of historic downtown Ukiah, the UBC Brew Crew focuses on creating hearty and robust organic ales and lagers. The beers are unfiltered and handcrafted in small batches, similar to the way beer was made before mass production was introduced to the industry.

Piazza de Campovida

By the time you've cruised up Highway 101 for a couple of hours and reached Hopland, food and drink are an idea whose time has come. Your first stop is Piazza de Campovida, which offers fresh small-batch brews handcrafted by Oakland's famed Linden Street Brewery in a convivial setting. Light pub fare along with handmade woodfired pizzas from the co-located pizzeria complete the setting for an excellent time.

Hopland Tap House

Frequent travelers on California Highway 101 will recognize the Hopland Tap House as the former Mendocino Brewing Company. The brick exterior hasn't changed much since the brewery's heyday, but a new owner has now revitalized the interior and added an outdoor seating area with barbecue. Enjoy one of the menu offerings while enjoying a taste or two of what's on tap.

Saucy Ukiah

Head for downtown Ukiah to experience brews with an attitude at Saucy. This lively restaurant serves pizza, salads, pasta and daily specials as well as an outstanding

selection of beers and cider on tap. Thursday nights are Pint Nights when a particular brewery is featured and the brewmaster is on hand to answer questions. Your first pint gets you a free glass! The knowledgeable bartenders are always willing to give you a taste to help your selection decision!

Shanachie Pub

Tiptoe down the narrow winding path next to Adam's Restaurant on Main Street in Willits and you'll land in Shanachie Pub. With its wide selection of beers and ciders on tap and an extensive wine list, Shanachie is the place to hang out, relax and enjoy the vibe where everyone counts as "local." The pub features regular live music events and there's an outdoor seating area for warm summer nights.

Westside Renaissance Market

You've got your picnic supplies all ready but you're missing one vital ingredient... beer! Yes, you could go to one of the major supermarket chains and pick up a six-pack, but a far more satisfying experience is to drive over to Ukiah's west side and talk to Scott at the Westside Renaissance Market. This neighborhood market, located on a tree-lined street, specializes in locally and family produced foods as well as a range of delightful specialty products from near and far... including Ukiah's best beer selection. Come to think of it, you can get all your picnic ingredients at the same place!

Founded in 2006, Foursight Wines's goal is to produce 100% estate wines in the French *monopole* model, with grapes sourced only from their own Charles Vineyard. The only 100% wind and solar powered winery in the county, **Philo** Ridge Vineyards maintains a tasting room in downtown Boonville, just a stroll away from restaurants and shops. A newcomer to the valley, Seebass Vineyards opened their doors in the summer of 2014. Their wines are created from their hand-harvested, hand-pruned, sustainably farmed and estate-grown fruit, which is grown "over the hill" in Talmage.

Located in the John Hanes Fine Art Gallery, Harmonique makes three different styles of gracefully aged Anderson Valley Pinot Noir wines and an unoaked Chardonnay. The name "Harmonique" recognizes a desire to create wines that harmonize with many foods and evoke a sense of their Burgundian heritage. Just a few miles northwest of Boonville is Elke Vineyards, a small, family-owned vineyard and winery. The friendly staff will guide you through the varietals and the Elke story. Halfway between Boonville and Philo is Lichen Estate, which produces exquisite still and sparkling wines, and a unique blend that will stump your wine aficionado friends!

Five miles west of Boonville, Philo and the surrounding area are chock-a-block with tasting rooms that carry wines with appeal to every palate. The first winery stop should be Goldeneye Winery, which offers a number of experiences, including estate tastings and alfresco picnic lunches with pairings of Goldeneye's wines. A hop, skip and a jump across the road is Balo Vineyards with two competitiongrade bocce courts, a dog recreation area, outdoor tables and, of course, their "killer" Pinot Noirs! The Mullins Family and Boo the dog love to welcome visitors.

Directly opposite Balo Vineyards is The Madrones, a Mediterranean-style compound comprised of four wine tasting rooms, a meeting place, nine beautifully appointed guest quarters, and the petite Stone & Embers restaurant. Drew Wines is a very small production family winery that consistently wins accolades. Across the courtyard, Knez Winery creates "single vineyard wines crafted


by the alchemy of ocean, fog, soil and patience." At 2,642 feet, Signal Ridge Vineyard is the highest altitude vineyard in Mendocino and neighboring wine producing counties. Sample their singular wines along with a companion beverage, Bite Hard Cider, every day at the tasting room. Bink Wines makes handcrafted, small-lot wines with intense flavor and character. The friendly tasting room is open Wednesday-Monday and you'll often find Rupert (the tasting room manager's dog) watching over the operations.

In the heart of Philo you'll find Baxter Winery, which produces handcrafted single vineyard wines focusing on the Anderson Valley and surrounding Mendocino appellations. Witching Stick Wines specializes in finding unique vineyards and producing refreshing, food-friendly wines with minerality and crispness.

Stop in at Scharffenberger Cellars to sample their lovely bubbly and view the displays of art by local artists. The gardens or porch are just the place to have a picnic, which you can arrange in advance. Too tense? Then turn at the sign of the loose goose and visit the friendly folks at Toulouse Vineyards.

Fresh apple cider is the big draw at Gowan's Oak Tree, a farm stand where you'll find 60 varieties of apples and all sorts of seasonal produce.

Philo Apple Farm is a certified organic/ biodynamic orchard that has evolved into




something more. Its honor system farm stand sells a diverse array of items, including fresh apples, pears, handmade chutneys, jams, ciders and jellies. There are also guest accommodations and its weekend cooking school offers meals on a walk-in basis.

A combination of Italian heritage and Northern California agriculture produce Brutocao Cellars' award-winning wines that pair well with food and friends! The folks at Navarro Vineyards have been growing grapes and making wine in the Anderson Valley since 1974. You won't find their wines at your local grocery store, so pick up some vino to go!

Spectacular valley views almost steal the scene at Edmeades/Champ de Rêves, but you'll be taken by the superb Champ de Reves Pinot Noirs as well as Edmeades' iconic Zins. With its unique





ENDOCINO COUNTY WINE MAP









Newly remodeled, Lazy Creek Vineyards lies in a bucolic setting complete with a new winery building and tasting room, rustic barn, cottages, fruit trees and vineyards. The oldest winery in Anderson Valley, Husch Vineyards invites you to sample your favorites in a converted pony barn dating back to the late 1800s. With their long farming heritage, Husch wines showcase the fruit in each bottle and reflect a true commitment to quality and value. **Roederer Estate** Brut is the first California sparkling wine to be produced by Champagne Louis Roederer. Barely visible from Highway 128, the rustic exterior emphasizes the natural beauty and relaxed charm of the Anderson Valley. Handley Cellars is where visitors can taste a wide selection of wines and shop in the folk art-inspired tasting room or enjoy a picnic in the shaded sculpture garden. The last tasting opportunity in the valley, Lula Cellars is a great place to enjoy a picnic and where you'll be greeted by Honey, the winery dog.


North County


North Coast

January

The ten-day Crab, Wine & Beer Festival, held at venues throughout the county, is guaranteed to chase away the winter blues with a crab cake cookoff, winemaker and brewmaster dinners, crabby cruises, and a whole lot more.

February

February not only signals romance but also the International Alsace Varietals Festival in bucolic Anderson Valley, where you can taste wines from around the world paired with local cheeses, oysters, Alsatian style treats and more.

April

Mendocino County is home to the annual Party for the Planet, which highlights the County's dedication to the sustainable and earth-friendly lifestyle.

May

The merry month of May brings artisan beer and pub grub out on the first Saturday of the month at the annual Legendary Boonville Beer Fest. Join the breweries at the Mendocino County Fairgrounds for a howling good time! Hop over the hill to Hopland to celebrate spring with Hopland Passport and then back to Anderson Valley for a panoply of world-class wines at the Pinot Noir Festival. Just in case you haven't had enough, head to Mendocino Village for a Taste of Chocolate, Wine & Ale!

June

On Father's Day weekend in June, meander the back roads during a Taste of Redwood Valley to sample library wines, unusual varietals, small production lots and tasting right out of the barrel. Take a sip or two at the Taste of Downtown Ukiah where wineries and breweries from throughout the region have tastings along with live music, vendors, and food.

July

Did someone say "Salmon"? You can eat our favorite fish to your heart's content at the World's Largest Salmon Barbecue held on the first Saturday of July at Noyo Harbor in Fort Bragg.

August

Why not stick around in August and enjoy the fun at the Yorkville Highlands Wine Festival? Get wet in a grape stomp, play games, and eat good food (think paella... lots of it!) at this annual festival showcasing wines from the Yorkville Highlands appellation.





September

September is time for **Winesong**, the county's premier wine auction and tasting event held at the Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens. Pirates in Point Arena? Yes, every year at the **Harbor & Seafood Festival**, which features fresh, local seafood and local brews. Just when you think you've tried everything, along comes the **Beer**, **Bison and Bluegrass Festival** showing off three of the county's star attractions.

October

We love abalone! There, we said it... and you too can get to love it at the **Abalone Cook-Off & Festival** in Noyo Harbor every October. This special event features abalone in every way, shape and form along with wacky booths, wine, beer and music. Then join the gang in Hopland for the second **Hopland Passport** event of the year.

November

Every fall, in November as the mushrooms begin to pop, Visit Mendocino County puts together a multitude of events for the ten-day **Mushroom**, **Wine & Beer** **Festival**. The signature event is the Mushroom, Wine & Beer Train with a mushroom cook-off, wine and beer tastings, mushroom forays and live music.

From the Farm to Your Fork

With its numerous microclimates, Mendocino County is a diverse and productive agricultural region. Farmers here grow a veritable cornucopia of crops: olives, apples, pears, peaches, and all kinds of greens. There are cattle ranches that raise beef, pork and buffalo naturally, and even makers of goat and other cheese.

Many county agricultural operations welcome visitors by appointment. The **Anderson Valley Foodshed Group** has published **Mendocino County's Local Food Guide**, which you can find online at www.mcfarm.org.

The easiest way to find local foods (including freshly caught seafood) from Mendocino producers is at farmers' markets around the county. For a list of markets, visit the Mendocino County Farmers' Market Association website at www.mcfarm.org.



Regions of Mendocino County

Mendocino County is a state of mind.

Spectacular scenery, sense of isolation, aesthetic sensibility, and strong community are the highlights of a trip to Mendocino County.

he reward at the start of a vacation or weekend is to pack a bag, fuel up, and head to a destination where you leave the stress behind. No matter where you come from, your first impression of Mendocino County is one of outstanding natural beauty: redwood forests and rivers from the north, rolling hills and the promise of the ocean from the east, the blue and gold of distant mountains from the south. This is what we offer... awe at the foot of a redwood tree, a gasp at the sight of a breaching whale, a sigh of pleasure from a sip of wine, handcrafted from century-old vines ... and our welcome.

The county's large geographical area is broadly divided into two separate, yet contiguous, parts: coastal and inland. And those areas are themselves subject to their own geo-partitions: north and south coast, Anderson Valley, and the Redwood Corridor. Each of the areas has its distinct attractions, yet there are commonalities to be found in fine wining and dining, outdoor recreation, and experiences.

The Redwood Corridor

The majesty of the redwoods and vistas of lush vineyards are just two of the defining characteristics of inland Mendocino County. With two routes into the heart of the county, travelers can opt to wind along Highway 128 through the Yorkville Highlands to Anderson Valley, or stay on Highway 101 side-by-side with the Russian River, passing through Hopland to Ukiah, the county's cultural center, and the forests and wilderness that await at the northern part of the county. Warm summer days with

cool nights provide the ideal atmosphere for family camping and rural getaways, while couples seeking a romantic weekend can snuggle up in cozy rooms in chic hotels and guest quarters. Fine wine connoisseurs and foodies find their particular slice of heaven throughout inland Mendocino County where handcrafted wines abound and locavore is the only way to eat. Outdoor activities, a train ride through the redwoods, and a multitude of hop stops, are just some of the many reasons visitors choose inland Mendocino County as their preferred destination.





The following destinations are listed from south to north on Highway 101—The Redwood Highway.

Hopland

Explore **The Solar Living Institute**'s 12 acres of grounds that contain kids' play areas, ponds, educational information, native plantings and **Real Goods**—the largest straw bale store in the U.S.

Need a break? Then stop in at the **Hopland Tap House**. With a great selection of beers on tap and relaxed surroundings, this is the roadside place to rest and take a breather. Across the road, check out the bocce ball courts at **Brutocao Cellars**, located in what used to be Hopland's high school. Vintage Marketplace offers the opportunity to taste wines at **McFadden Tasting Room** and **Graziano Family of Wines**.

Mendocino County produces great olive oil and sparkling wine and you can get a taste of both at Olivino/Terra Sávia while you browse the displays of eclectic art and furniture. Then head north and fantasize about estate living on the 180-acre Jeriko Estate winery or visit the only wine caves in the county at Saracina Ranch. If it's a view you're craving, there's no better place to stop than the terrace at RIVINO with its breathtaking vista of the Ukiah valley.

Ukiah

Thanks to tree-shaded streets, an inviting downtown, and a vibrant cultural life, Ukiah was once named California's best small town—and the sixth best in the entire country. The largest city in Mendocino County, Ukiah is home to a bumper crop of Bartlett pears, Victorian architecture and a distinctive laid-back vibe. For a taste of the past, saunter over to the Grace Hudson Museum for a personal tour of the Sun House, a stunning 1911 Craftsman bungalow offering an inside look into the lifestyle of artist Grace Carpenter Hudson.

Hike and bike up a storm on a host of hiking trails in the western hills and Ukiah's cycle-friendly streets. Golfers can try for a birdie at the only 18-hole golf course in the county. Follow the signs to Lake Mendocino for outdoor recreation or take a trek to the City of 10,000 Buddhas for some spiritual renewal.

Willits

Nestled in Little Lake Valley, Willits is the "Heart of Mendocino County" and "The Gateway to the Redwoods," declarations spelled out on the sign that straddles Main Street. Trivia alert: Willits

is home to the first stoplight on U.S. 101 north of San Francisco!

Entering Willits from the south, you will find traveler's necessities—motels, gas stations, auto shops, and supermarkets. But just north of Highway 20, the route to the coast, lies downtown and many of Willits' small-town charms.

... And Beyond

The towns of Laytonville, Leggett, and Piercy each reflect the logging history of the region. Leggett boasts the outdoor delights of **Standish-Hickey Recreation Area**, and it's where you can leave 101 to intersect Highway 1 and follow the winding highway to the coast. Top spots include the **Chandelier Drive-Thru Tree** and **Confusion Hill**. Standing 315 tall and 21 feet wide, the 2,400-year-old drive-thru tree is a definite show stopper. **Confusion Hill** in Piercy features a gravity-defying house, Redwood Shoe house, mountain train ride, and the world's largest standing chainsaw sculpture.

Redwood Corridor Dining

Choose from numerous dining opportunities on your journey from south to north along the Redwood Corridor. Long a fixture on Highway 101, the

Bluebird Café in Hopland serves homemade pies and an innovative and diverse burger line-up—including buffalo and wild boar! Across the highway, stop in for wood-fired pizza, beer, and wine at Piazza de Campovida. The fire pit on the patio makes for a warm gathering place as evening turns to night.

In Ukiah, the historic brick façade at **OCO Time** belies the blonde hardwood flooring and contemporary design of the dining room, where you can savor sushi, sake, and its signature egg and noodle dish—the Hiroshima-style oco-nomiyaki.

High quality Mexican fare is found at **Taqueria Jalos** and **El Molcajete**, and for a truly authentic atmosphere, stop in for roadside tacos made-to-order at **Chavez Market Taqueria**.

With its brick walls and beautiful wood tables washed by soft ambient lighting, **Patrona Restaurant & Lounge** lets you enjoy its seasonal cuisine in a distinctive setting. Relax on the outdoor patio with a featured seasonal cocktail made with fresh juices and organic ingredients.

Fun, hip and, well, the name says it all, **Saucy** is the hottest spot in Ukiah. The heart of the restaurant is the wood-fired pizza oven with many tempting choices, and a gluten-free crust option if you ask.

Behind the bar is a revolving selection of on-tap craft beers, ciders, and wines.

For casual lunches, **Schat's Bakery & Café** makes its breads, pastries, sandwiches, salads, and soups from scratch daily. Vegetarians and vegans, as well as omnivores, will delight in the temptations at **Taste Buds**, while those who favor a touch of the exotic will be keen to dine at **Dora's Gourmet Café**, which features long-time favorites as well as fejoida, the national dish of Brazil.

On the south end of town, enjoy the atmosphere at **Crush Italian Steakhouse**. The sports bar specializes in local brews, wines, and a bar menu, while the dining room with its comfortable booths offers a fine dining experience. For local foods, wines, beers, and snacks, you can't go wrong at **Westside Renaissance Market** or **Ukiah Natural Foods**.

Head north over Ridgewood Grade on Highway 101, and you descend into Little Lake Valley and the town of Willits. Despite its western bar exterior, **Al's Redwood Room** serves outstanding Thai food. The bar first opened in 1901 and is the oldest continually operating business in Willits.

Any guesses about what **Busters Burgers** & Brew serves? Draught selections include several Mendocino County

favorites served alongside local grass-fed beef from John Ford Ranch.

Dine on fresh-caught fish from the coast, locally raised meat and veggies, and choose from a fine wine list featuring Mendocino County wines at **Adam's Restaurant**. It's located on Main Street in front of **Shanachie Pub**, where locals go for music, wine, beer, and a good time.

The railroad-themed Loose Caboose Café is popular for lunch thanks to a selection of soups, salads, oven-toasted sandwiches, and old-fashioned milk shakes. If you're searching for sushi, pop into It's Time for fresh fish and vegetarian selections. Breakfast and lunch goodies are aplenty at the newly opened Brickhouse Coffee on the corner of Main and Commercial. Load up on picnic supplies, healthy food, and snacks at the independent eco-friendly Mariposa Market grocery.

If the tang of Texas BBQ is your thing, fit in a stop at the **Chief's Smokehouse** in Laytonville, which is newly renovated with indoor and outdoor dining. Just stop at the sign that says "BBQ and Laundromat!" The walls are adorned with posters from 1970s rock concerts and the menu features barbecue, sandwiches, and shakes. Quirky and delicious, **The Peg**

House provides easy travel sustenance to hungry hikers in Leggett. Ask about their famous mookies.

Take a scenic side trip off Highway 101 on Highway 162, skirt the Eel River and explore the unique Round Valley town of Covelo. For dining, the North Fork Café is a favorite for its mostly Italian menu of salads, pastas, pizzas, steaks, and seafood with a good selection of wine and beer.

Redwood Corridor Shopping

Ukiah may be small, but it's openminded and big enough in spirit for a wide variety of businesses. Liv Fashion Boutique will appeal to those looking for up-to-the-minute designs. Beneath its distinctive art nouveau-style sign, La Tré carries a selection of irresistible dresses, boots, handbags, and other accessories.

Shoefly and Sox is the go-to Ukiah spot for fashionable, comfortable shoes, as well as handbags and accessories. Next door, you'll find Boutique 120 with fashionable clothing for men and women. Explore trend-forward natural fiber clothing, lingerie, scarves and other accessories at Graces on Main, which is also home to earthenware art pieces from the Jan Hoyman studio.

There are a number of Ukiah stores with distinctive ideas for your home. Habitat specializes in gifts and fine house wares, while the Mendocino Bounty marketplace carries unique kitchen and garden accessories along with local foods and wines. Elegant and intimate Three Sisters has gifts, candles, and other items and Bona Marketplace specializes in hats, leather goods, jewelry, and other inviting items.

Browse around the Mendocino Book **Company** with its wide selection of books, periodicals, newspapers, and assorted ephemera. Here's where you'll find books written about Mendocino County and comfortable chairs to preview your choices. Kids get in on the fun at Little Brown Bear, which carries a wide selection of upscale infant and children's clothing and accessories.

Shops in Willits carry items from the practical to the outrageous. JD Redhouse & Mercantile, a general store with a twist, offers everything for ranch and farm living plus a fun collection of gifts for kids of all ages as well as an oldfashioned soda fountain.

For classy and sassy gifts, sophisticated kitchenware, unique items for the home and an impressive selection of gift cards, Cat's Meow is the place to go.

Moon Lady specializes in up-to-the minute fashions, hard-to-find upscale brands, and a large selection of footwear. They also offer a growing selection of stylish fashions for men. Mazahar defines gypsy-chic with its sumptuous selections of natural fiber clothing, jewelry, footwear and steam punk gear for the annual Willits Kinetic Carnivale.

Monkey Wrench appeals to both men and women with its line of casual wear and children's clothing. Tiger Lily's Boutique and Off the Cuff both offer stylish selections for the truly hip. Parents looking for children's apparel and accessories will find variety at Buttercups Children's Boutique. Kids of all ages will relish the collection of rubber stamps, card making, paper crafting and scrapbooking tools, and art supplies at The Goods' Stamp Shoppe. While in town browse at the **Book Juggler** with its over 80,000 volumes organized in a meandering maze.

Redwood Corridor Lodging

After a day of fun, rest your head at one of Ukiah's many hotels. For a rejuvenating experience, stay at one of the private accommodations at local estate wineries. In Hopland, the inn at Piazza de Campovida, with its deluxe suites, is an ideal home base for exploring the surrounding wine country. The Super 8 Ukiah is Mendocino County's only Certified Green Hotel and is committed to environmental practices. There's an EV charging station and its breakfasts feature 100% organic coffees and biodegradable tableware. Other lodging options include the Travelodge, Fairfield Inn, Hampton Inn, and the Comfort Inn.

Lodging in Willits ranges from national favorites (Best Western & Super 8) to unique local inns and a handful of rental properties. Baechtel Creek Inn & Spa pampers guests by arranging tour itineraries, spa appointments, dinner reservations, Skunk Train tickets, and more. Relax in the day spa with a range of organic skin and body treatments.

Redwood cabins, farm-fresh meals, and an incomparable location on the Eel River all add to the appeal of the family camp at Emandal—A Farm on a River, where you can attend multiday sessions or stay overnight depending on availability. Book your trip during the Cowboy Poetry event, with its live music and Apple Pie Throwdown.

Just five minutes from Willits, Brooktrails Lodge is set among the beautiful towering redwoods with easy access to hiking trails and the nine-hole Brooktrails Golf Course.

Yorkville Highlands & Anderson Valley

A popular route into coastal Mendocino County involves taking picturesque and winding Highway 128 from Cloverdale westward. Begin by snaking through the Yorkville Highlands, known by the cognoscenti as "Les Petits Tetons," and on to Boonville, the "bahlest" town in the county, and out to the coast. While you're here though, stop and appreciate the good life found in this verdant and abundant land.

Boonville

In the heart of Anderson Valley, Boonville is the hot spot on the road to the coast. If you're thirsty for some local brew, pull in to Anderson Valley Brewing Company where you can drink a pint, play disc golf, or take a tour. Pennyroyal Farms is across from the brewery; their award-winning goat and sheep cheese is widely available locally. Boonville is also home to winery tasting rooms, shops, and galleries.


Philo

Just a dot on the map, Philo is home to a number of wine tasting rooms, plenty of apples and pears, and recycled redwood artifacts at Architectural Elements of Anderson Valley.

Valley Dining

A passion for local and sustainable foods is evident in the fresh and evolving menu at Boonville's Aquarelle Wine Bar & Café, located at the former Horn of Zeese (cup of coffee in Boontling!). A prix fixe menu is just the ticket at the Boonville Hotel's restaurant, Table 128, where the wine bar is a favorite gathering spot. Sample homestyle fare such as chicken pot pie at Lauren's Café, which is a valley dinner favorite, especially on Thursday, quiz night.

Create your own picnic at Boonville General Store, with its well-stocked graband-go foods including a selection of local Pennyroyal Farms goat and sheep cheeses. Mosswood Market has panini, soups, salads, coffees, teas, pastries, and desserts while Boont Berry Farm is a good bet for healthy foods, including vegan baked goods.



The **Buckhorn Boonville** is the place to go for good pub grub and beer, and if you're looking for some sweet treats, pick up ingeniously flavored ice creams and confections at Paysanne.

Petite in size, Philo's Stone & Embers, located at The Madrones, packs a powerful food punch with a menu specializing in local foods and a county-specific wine list. Hungry for authentic Mexican cuisine? Stop at Libby's for some of the best carnitas around. Or take a ride a few miles father west for a meal to remember at **Coq** Au Vin where Madame et Monsieur produce authentic French country cuisine.

Valley Shopping

Boonville offers plenty of shopping opportunities for delightful eclectic gifts and goodies. All That Good Stuff features local arts and crafts, jewelry, cards, toys, and a fine assortment of browsable objects. Gifts galore, contemporary art, and fine crafts are at the Rookie-To Gallery, located in a pristine 1930s California bungalow. Rookie-To refers to the call of the California quail.

Farmhouse Mercantile houses sophisticated linens, tableware, fabrics, and whimsical knick-knacks you'll want to take home as a souvenir. Next door, head down memory lane with a browse around the Fish Rock Farm Girls' antique store.

Your sweet tooth will be sated at the Boonville Chocolate Shop with its wide assortment of tasty treats, located in the rail cars parked downtown. Just beyond Philo, look for the **Pot Shop** sign to stop and browse Alexis Moyer's imaginative ceramic creatures and totems.

Valley Lodging

Just over the county line, enjoy the rural sophistication of Highlands Estate B&B, set in 20+ acres of pristine countryside.

If Fido's along for the ride, **The Other Place** has four contemporary dog-friendly private cottages in secluded settings ranging from ridgetop to creekside, or consider a stay at the **Boonville Downtown** cottage, a secluded getaway with views of the vines and hills.

On Highway 128 in Philo, **The Madrones** is a reminder of the similarities between Anderson Valley and the landscape of Tuscany. The estate contains nine stylishly appointed Guest Quarters, with room for fourteen guests, along with four tasting rooms and a restaurant.

At Indian Creek Inn, enjoy the hillside lodging views or the Log Cabin, just a step away from the Navarro River. The Philo Apple Farm, known for its certified organic/biodynamic apples and pears, offers overnight stays in their cozy orchard cabins. You can take cooking classes and browse the "honor system" fruit market.

The Coast

Wild and scenic is an understated description of Mendocino County's coastline. From the placid mouth of the Garcia River to the towering mountains of the Lost Coast to the quaint Village of Mendocino, the coastal region invites you to revel in its landscape and history. Sometimes shrouded by a fine layer of ocean fog and other times crystal clear, the coast offers a panoply of B&Bs and hotels appealing to couples in search of a quiet getaway. Families feel at home at a vacation rental or kid-friendly hotel/ motel. With beaches galore all the way up the coast, there's plenty of relaxing, paddling, whale and seal watching, and hiking for all ages.

South Coast

With its wild and natural feel, the South Coast offers crashing waves, magical ocean vistas, and miles of hiking on cliff tops and beaches.

Gualala

Gualala (pronounced wa-LA-la), on Highway 1, is the southern gateway to Mendocino County and, in addition to being one of the county's artistic centers, it hosts outstanding restaurants and lodging. With its eclectic collections of clothing, shoes, gifts and home accessories, Red Stella specializes in "coastal living with an urban edge." The Market at Placewares offers specialty foods and beautiful objects for the home to the south coast. Studio 391 has original artwork and photography that captures the natural beauty of the area.


Anchor Bay


Point Arena

Situated on the closest point of land to the Hawaiian Islands, the **Point Arena Lighthouse** is well worth the 115 foot-climb to the top for the stunning views. Also be sure to visit the museum and gift shop.

Manchester

Droves of driftwood scatter the beach expanse at **Manchester State Park**, where there's opportunity for plenty of outdoor activities. A very popular **KOA Campground** operates next to the ocean.

Elk

Famous for its inspiring clifftop location and **Greenwood State Beach**, Elk is a perfect getaway and wedding spot. Step outside and experience the Pacific Ocean beneath a star-lit sky.

South Coast Dining

Trinks Café is a popular Gualala gathering spot for breakfast and lunch, thanks to its ocean views, espresso drinks, and an emphasis on local,

seasonal, and organic ingredients in its salads and sandwiches. Trinks also serves gelato from Gualala's own **Creamery Pazzo Marco**.

The chais and espressos at **Blue Canoe Coffee and Tea** have won raves from Yelp reviewers. With its mouthwatering ribs, pulled pork, and brisket, **Bones Roadhouse** is a must-stop for barbecue lovers.

Just north of Gualala, the onion-domed turrets of **St. Orres** pay homage to the region's Russian history, but you'll also be drawn to the fine dining of one of Northern California's favorite restaurants.

A surprise find is in Anchor Bay, where the **Thai Kitchen** serves authentic Thai food made with fresh, brightly flavored local ingredients.

Point Arena is known for the distinctive blue façade of Franny's Cup & Saucer where Franny and mom, Barbara, cook up enticing arrays of baked goods for breakfast, lunch, and dessert. Just next door, Everything Under the Sun offers fair-trade goods from around the world. If you're in town late in the week,

Uneda Eat will be open. This "occasional café" serves bold and rustic California cuisine. The **Pier Chowder House & Tap Room** specializes in seafood dishes and provides a unique gathering spot for fishermen, surfers, locals, and tourists.

In Elk, old-fashioned, at-your-request service characterizes **Queenie's Roadhouse Café**, which is housed in a 1902 former service station. Its breakfasts and lunches combine the natural, the local, and the organic. Don't miss the house-made herbed biscuits.

Bridget Dolan's Pub, located in the Griffin House Inn, may serve the most elegant pub food you'll ever find. Pick up a hearty sandwich made to order with all the trimmings at the Elk Store and then head across the highway to Greenwood State Beach. The store features a wide range of "Made in Mendocino" products.

South Coast Lodging

From your room at the cozy **Gualala Country Inn**, you'll have views of either the Pacific Ocean or the scenic Gualala River.

Anchor Bay has a unique lodging choice at the **Mar Vista Cottages**, which were built in 1936 as rental units for sports fishermen and have been lovingly updated in a clean Shaker/Swedish style. The grounds feature an organic orchard, pick-yourown garden and fresh eggs delivered to your door each morning.

As its name suggests, the **Whale Watch Inn** delivers commanding ocean views from 18 individually designed rooms, which all have private decks and fireplaces. Guests also enjoy access to a private beach.

At **St. Orres**, you can stay in architecturally distinctive cabins and cottages set beautifully among the redwoods and in meadows with ocean views.

The quaint cottages at **B. Bryan Preserve** are full of reclaimed furnishings such as Frank Lloyd Wright windows and original Fillmore West posters from the '60s. At the **Wharf Master's Inn** you can stay in the historic 1865 Wharf Master's House,

which has a 50-foot deck and is the oldest home in Point Arena, or tuck in to one of the cozy cottages at the **Coast Guard House**.

Luxury and privacy are both found at **The Inn at Victorian Gardens**, located in Manchester. This exquisite inn is situated on 92 acres, just across from the Pacific Ocean. Overlooking the ocean between Manchester and Elk, **Irish Beach** is a community of vacation homes and cabins perched on the ocean bluffs, many of which are available for rent.

The **Elk Cove Inn & Spa** is a Craftsmanstyle mansion dating back to 1883. Well-appointed rooms and private cottages feature sparkling ocean views with private beach access. Enjoy gourmet breakfasts, the make-your-own cocktail bar, and a spa, which uses organic oils, minerals, and salts for body treatments and massages.





North Coast

The North Coast entices guests to savor an irresistible combination of natural beauty, cultivated lodging, and history along miles of undeveloped shoreline.

Albion

The hamlet of Albion is distinguished by its two bridges, spanning the Albion River and Little Salmon Creek. Built in 1944 when steel and concrete were in short supply, the Albion River Bridge is the last wooden bridge still in use on State Route 1!

Little River

The cove at Little River is the ideal spot to watch waves and the divers who come to seek out that very special sea offering, abalone! Just up the hill on the north side of the cove is the Spring Ranch trail that runs along the clifftops, complete with blowhole and great seal and whale watching spots.

Mendocino

There's quaint and then there's the Village of Mendocino. Listed on the National Register of Historic places, the architecture, water towers, and stunning location evoke the landscape of 19th century Cape Cod.

Every building embodies the village's unique history, with its houses weathered by salt, air, fog, and wind. Gardens filled with lush foliage and bright blooms spill over the weathered fences of superbly maintained houses. Many vintage buildings have found new life as B&Bs, shops, and restaurants; the historic red church (with its stained-glass windows still intact) is now an organic co-op grocery. And nature is just a step away at the nearby Mendocino Headlands State Park, where the only sounds are the crashing waves and the flapping wings and calls of seabirds.

Fort Bragg & Noyo Harbor

The biggest city on the Mendocino Coast, Fort Bragg is home to the worldfamous Skunk Train, the extraordinary Glass Beach, and the spectacular Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens. Noyo Harbor is a working port with a marina, where you can board a crabcatching or whale-watching cruise or take a leisurely kayak ride upstream on Noyo River—be sure to watch for wildlife! Enjoy dining with a view of the harbor where playful seals poke their snouts above the water.

North Coast Dining

Sunset magazine declared the **Albion River Inn** one of the West's best small inns. The inn combines oceanside lodging (with fireplaces, whirlpool tubs, and ocean-view decks) and superb dining—check out the incomparable Scotch and wine lists.

Relax with sophisticated dining and an ocean view at the **Ledford House**, where the menu is Mediterranean style peppered with influences from Asia and the Americas. The bar and dining rooms are great for whale watching and sunset spotting.

Farm-to-fork is the story at **5200 Restaurant** and Lounge at the Heritage House Resort where you can relax over a drink or dinner and take in spectacular ocean views.


There's nowhere better to catch the sunset than at **Ole's Whale Watch Bar** at the Little River Inn. Chef Marc Dym is responsible for the sinfully good cioppino served alongside his awardwinning crab cakes.

As the name suggests, fish is first and foremost at the petite **Wild Fish** restaurant perched on the cliffs in Little River. The locally sourced lunches and dinners are served alongside a stunning view. For extra indulgence, try Liz's Sticky Toffee Pudding!

At the Glendeven Inn, the elegant **Wine Bar**[n] serves Mendocino County wines while you can dine at **bistro** | **150** for farm-to-table dinners and where everything is sourced within 150 miles.

Rising from a wooded hillside south of Mendocino like the timber lodge of your dreams, the four-diamond Stanford Inn features **Ravens Restaurant**, one of the country's finest vegan restaurants. Sourcing their food from the inn's organic garden and local purveyors, the restaurant's chefs produce artfully crafted dishes that belie the idea that meat is essential to a meal.





Celebrated in such publications as *The New York Times, Wine Spectator*, and *Coastal Living*, the historic **MacCallum House Inn & Restaurant** is one of the county's top food destinations. Almost everything served is made in the house kitchen—including breads and pastas—and the produce, meat and fish are local and sustainable.

The legendary **Café Beaujolais** almost single-handedly put Mendocino on the map as an international dining destination. The restaurant serves California-style French fare prepared with organic local produce and humanely raised meats. Breads and pastries are house-made.

In the Village of Mendocino, the restaurant of the historic **Mendocino Hotel & Garden Suites** received the *Wine Spectator* Award of Excellence for 11 straight years. It's the place to go for a romantic and intimate evening meal in the beautifully appointed Victorian Dining Room.

Family-run **955 Ukiah Street Restaurant** has earned praise from publications including *Bon Appétit* and *Wine Spectator. Appellation* said the restaurant "exemplifies many of the reasons visitors and residents love this coast."





Located in the heart of Mendocino is **Trillium**—named for the flowers that bloom deep inside redwood forests—a restaurant with an outside deck, a beautiful culinary flower garden and blue water views over Big River Bay.

The **Mendocino Café**, with its garden setting, serves dishes inspired and influenced by its owner's world travels, while its sister restaurant, **Flow Restaurant & Lounge**, has a full bar and great whale watching opportunities from the deck and windows.

Enjoy the casual vibe at **Frankie's**, where everything from pizza and ice cream is organic and lovingly prepared. The **Goodlife Café and Bakery** offers all sorts of delicious morning and lunchtime treats as well as a wide selection of coffee drinks and teas. Step around the back of the café and you'll find **Mendo Burgers**, which serves up delicious organic beef, turkey, or veggie burgers with all sorts of fixings, as well as huge portions of delectable fries. It's pet-friendly too. **Patterson's Pub** brings a touch of Ireland to the edge of the Pacific in a onetime church rectory building dating to 1866.

A short distance north in Fort Bragg, the restaurant choices run the gamut from raw food options to steaks and local seafood. Don't miss the remarkable cocktails and an innovative bar menu at **Barbelow**, located in the historic Company Store building. Just up the stairs is **Mendo Bistro**, consistently named one of Zagat Survey's top restaurants on the California coast. Chef Nicholas Petti has been the winner of the annual Crab Cake Cook-Off numerous times and has been featured in *Sunset* and many other publications.

Benvenuto! For a taste of Italy on the north coast, you can't go wrong with the authentic food at **Cucina Verona** in the heart of Fort Bragg's downtown. What to choose? Should it be the pasta? Or perhaps the gnocchi or risotto, but there's also the fresh seafood and pizza. An extensive local wine list rounds out the experience. Live music on occasional nights. Just around the corner, go for the cuisine of northern Italy at **Luna Trattoria**.

Try **Nit's Café** for its delectable and authentic Thai and Asian dishes. Or head to **The Q**, home of incredible house-cooked pulled pork, baby back ribs, blackened rock fish, and a wide range of sides.

The taste of the Yucatan awaits at **Mayan Fusion** in Noyo Harbor. Its sister eatery is **Silver's at the Wharf**, popular since it began as a coffee shop serving fishing crews in the 1950s. Gaze through walls of windows to watch seals cruising the harbor and the comings and goings of boats, while enjoying a fresh fish menu.

For a sample of the raw food movement at its best, **Living Light Café** prepares organic raw vegan dishes. It's part of a complex including an inn, a market, and a culinary arts institute—a premier school for raw vegan chefs.

For delicious, healthy, and organic breakfasts, **Café One** is the place to go; locals swear by its Hippie Scramble egg dish. The Wizard of Oz—themed **Egghead's** serves local Dungeness Crab Eggs Benedict with three scratch-made Hollandaise sauces and cinnamon raisin bread French toast. **Headlands Coffeehouse** is a casual café serving bagels, breakfast burritos, granola, and Belgian waffles. It's open for light dinners, too, with live music (mostly jazz) every night.

The **Cliff House** overlooks the ocean and the mouth of Noyo Harbor from a cliff top location. Casual options at Noyo Harbor include **Cap'n Flint's** and its famous chowder, **Heron's by the Sea**, and **Sea Pal Cove**, a local favorite on sunny days.

When pizza calls, you know you have to respond. So head to **Piaci Pub & Pizzeria**, which offers delicious thincrust pizza, an ever-changing array of craft beers and ciders on tap, local wines, as well as calzones, salads, and sandwiches.



You know you're tempted but not quite sure about the candy cap mushroom ice cream at **Cowlick's**... well, fear no more! It's absolutely delicious with its strong hint of maple syrup. Enjoy this and other seasonal favorites—including North Coast Brewery Beer Brittle ice cream—every day.

Downtown Cleone's Mexican restaurant, **The Purple Rose** is beloved for its famous margaritas that draw devotees from all along the coast.

North Coast Shopping

Stroll around the dozens of shops in the Village of Mendocino for one-of-a-kind artwork, gifts, and clothing. For women's wear, **Fancy That** carries high-end clothing, scarves, handbags and other accessories. **Rainsong** specializes in fashion for hip, stylish men and women, and just down the street you can visit their sister shoe store for the right pair of shoes. **Bébé Lapin** carries fashionable children's clothes and accessories.

Step into **Sallie Mac** and you're transported to the European countryside. French bistro furniture, whimsical garden art, linens, and ceramics fill the bright, airy store. Vintage quilts, aloha shirts, and retro-inspired products are just some of the unusual collection of artifacts and antiques displayed in **The Attic of Mendocino** on Main Street.

In the village, you'll find original shops that reflect the community's independent and creative spirit. **Gallery Bookshop & Bookwinkle's Children's Books** serves local residents and visitors from around the world with an extensive inventory of current titles, plus a large selection of eclectic volumes not

likely to be found online or at any urban mega-store. Out of This World combines science with fun, and stocks quality binoculars as well as toys and novelties. Don't forget to peek through the telescopes lining the store's window—you may get lucky and spot a whale or two! Reflections offers a world-class selection of kaleidoscopes made by leading craftspeople who specialize in these beloved optical devices.

For gifts and souvenirs, both Big River Trading Company and Mendocino Gift Company are good stops. The Village Toy Store is a low-key, kid friendly place with an excellent selection of toys and games from Europe.


Papa Bear's Chocolate Haus crafts candy right before your eyes, ranging from taffy and caramel apples to a signature white chocolate with fresh raspberries. Among the truffles at the Mendocino Chocolate Company is the delectable orange-flavored Angela, created and named for red-haired Angela Lansbury when she worked on location here shooting Murder, She Wrote.

Located in a historic church, the collectively operated **Corners of the Mouth** natural food store is a must for anyone seeking healthy and organic foods. For picnic supplies, check out the cheese counter and olive bar at **Harvest Market at Mendosa's**, a specialty grocery store, wine purveyor, and old-fashioned general store.

In Fort Bragg, you'll find boutiques with diverse collections, such as **Splendiferous** with its many clothing lines for "women, children, yoga, life" to specialty stores, such as **Pippi's Longstockings**, which zeroes in on socks, tights, and stockings. Or pick up a special something for your romantic stay on the coast at **Understuff**, the specialty lingerie shop. In addition to clothing, the selection at **Tangents** includes an eclectic grab bag of novelties, candles, and jewelry.

Declaring, "We believe all women no matter what their size (or age) deserve great fashion," **Toto Zaida** is committed to style, comfort, and affordability. The weather on the coast is changeable, but you're covered if you need an extra layer. Stop at the **Outdoor Store** for serious sports footwear, jackets, maps, and more.





The **Visit Mendocino Marketplace** offers a great selection of locally made and sourced products, sweatshirts, calendars, and a wealth of information about Mendocino County.

Fiddles & Cameras lives up to its name. It's an old-fashioned stop for camera, photography, and darkroom supplies (including digital needs). And yes, it stocks stringed musical instruments too. Racine's Art & Office Supplies is definitely a haven for the creative and an inviting place to browse, thanks to its intricate hand-drawn window displays and wall art.


Jammed with high-quality toys, games, models, and puzzles from around the world, **The Spunky Skunk** is a great stop on Franklin Street. **ER Energy** carries a myriad of goods for the kitchen and home, from barbecues and wood stoves to cookware and gift items.

North Coast Lodging

Long an iconic location on the north coast, the newly renovated **Heritage House Resort** welcomes guests to its stunning location nestled on 37 acres of oceanfront land. Beautiful rooms with luxe appointments provide a welcome respite from everyday life.

Romantic **Glendeven Inn** is a farmstead with a three-story farmhouse, a carriage house, and an annex. The house llamas enjoy their own pasture, chickens on the property provide eggs for the breakfasts, and free-ranging guinea fowl control insects in the manicured gardens. Across the road is the **Inn at Cobbler's Walk**, with newly renovated luxurious rooms and suites, and Rachel's Cottage, which provides the ultimate in privacy.

In business for over 75 years, the **Little River Inn** has been hosting families and friends for generations. Run by the fifth generation of innkeepers, this is your home away from home on the north coast. It also has the Mendocino coast's only golf course.





It may be rainy outside, but you'll be cozy and warm at Dennen's Victorian Farmhouse. This family-run B&B features wood-burning fireplaces, antique furnishings, spectacular views, and superb house-made breakfasts served en suite.

With its commanding ocean view, the Inn at Schoolhouse Creek has a variety of accommodations, including a water tower set among nine acres of gardens, meadows, and forests. The inn's Creekside Spa occupies a luxury yurt near an ocean-view hot tub and sauna. and offers massages, facials, aromatherapy, body polishes, and foot treatments.

The contemporary style of the nine Cottages at Little River Cove creates a distinct alternative to the historic and rustic feel of much of Mendocino County's lodging. The cottages (six are pet-friendly) overlook the ocean from atop a bluff and come equipped with full modern kitchens and baths. Check into the **Andiron Inn** for a retro-chic experience in any of their eleven cabins. This is where the Fifties are celebrated every day! Commanding an idyllic spot above Big River, the Stanford Inn is the coast's only eco-resort. Enjoy the top-notch accommodations, wonderful views, and organic gardens. The Mendocino Center for Living Well offers a full menu of massages, wraps, aromatherapy, scrubs, yoga and nutrition classes. Or, if you feel like some exercise, rent a bike, kayak or canoe at Catch-A-Canoe & Bicycles Too!

The New York Times says, "There is no better place to spend the evening than at the MacCallum House." You can spend more than an evening at this inn in the heart of Mendocino. Surrounded by lush gardens, accommodations include suites in the main house, cottages, and rooms in the Barn.

The New England-style Victorian that's home to Headlands Inn Bed and Breakfast dates back to 1868. Originally a barbershop and later a fine restaurant, the inn combines a unique history with luxury and meticulous service. Many of the rooms have ocean views and wood-burning fireplaces, and the breakfasts are positively lavish.

From a commanding bluff-top setting, Agate Cove Inn takes in views of waves rolling onto the rocky Mendocino coast. The inn offers cottages with such amenities as private decks, four-poster feathertop beds, and fireplaces. There are also rooms in the 1860 farmhouse, including Sunstone, with its ocean-view spa tub.

With cottages overlooking Big River beach and four rooms in a Craftsmanstyle home, Alegria Inn offers a range of experiences and moods. Cove Cottage is an intimate escape with Asian accents and an incredible setting above the beach. Sister properties include the **Raku** House with four rooms and suites, vacation rentals at Alegria's Victorian-style Village Farm Retreat, and the Dolphin House, which sits on a bluff top overlooking the Pacific Ocean.

Two village inns boast on-site spas. The Sea Rock Inn and Spa, with its stunning setting, offers massage and sauna. And Sweetwater Gardens, at the Sweetwater Spa and Inn, is famous for its redwood hot tubs and sauna (including a private tub and sauna suite).

A host of opportunities await couples, families, and friends looking for their own private getaway home. Options include inland rentals and coastal homes in settings ranging from tame to dramatic. Travelers can literally move right in and enjoy all the benefits of having their own private house. There are hundreds of these vacation homes throughout the County, each with its own unique character. Some sit right on the edge of the ocean, providing panoramic views, and many can accommodate large groups. Coast Getaways and Mendocino Coast **Reservations** are just two of the companies that offer a wide range of accommodations and will guide travelers in their selection.

Celebrated in both The New York Times and Sunset magazine, the Weller House Inn in Fort Bragg was built in 1886 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The ten guest rooms include two in the house's historic water tower (Fort Bragg's tallest point) and its redwood ballroom has become a hot spot to tango.

The **Grey Whale Inn** can proclaim two very different firsts: It was the city's original hospital and 65 years later, the first Fort Bragg B&B. The three-story redwood structure offers individually decorated rooms (some with ocean views) named for county landmarks.

The **Atrium B&B** features themed rooms in a lovely historic home facing the ocean. The cozy **Glass Beach Inn** has six rooms in the main house and three in the cottage on the property. Within an easy walk to Glass Beach, the **Country Inn** has eight lovely rooms in an 1890s residence.

Set in an appealing park-like setting, the cottages and suites at Shoreline Cottages offer convenient access to the ocean and a six-person hot tub! A long-time favorite with visitors, the Beachcomber Motel & Spa sits alongside the Ten-Mile Coastal Trail running from the north side of Pudding Creek Trestle all the way to Ten Mile Beach. Guests can rent a bicycle to ride the paved trail paralleling the ocean. The pet-friendly **Surf & Sand Lodge** affords guests almost instant beach access and a picturesque 10-minute walk into town. Enjoy the view of Pudding Creek from your balcony at the Beach House Inn.



Whether you seek an inspiring experience in nature, a restorative retreat or a locale in which to reflect and create, Mendocino County offers bountiful opportunities for artistic expression and connection.

he call to explore, discover, and document the natural beauty of Mendocino County has drawn artists from all over the world, helping to create the unique communities of Mendocino County. Just look around at the works of nationally renowned local artists in many of the county's restaurants, wineries, and inns. Mendocino County also hosts cultural events throughout the year: art fairs, music and film festivals, and writers' conferences.

Collectors of unique arts and crafts will delight in the many cooperative galleries, some of which have been in business for decades. Purchase a photograph, painting, sculpture, or a print on locally harvested pampas grass to remind you of your visit or, better yet, take a class with a master potter, wood worker or jeweler at one of our many art centers. Indulge and deepen your own creativity.

Keep your camera handy! If you aren't already an artist when you arrive, you may become one by the time you depart!

Redwood Corridor

In Hopland, stop at **Terra Sávia** to not only taste wine and olive oil, but also appreciate the art that fills their ware-house/tasting room—from handcrafted furniture made from reclaimed wood and graceful willow to large oil tapestries.

The **Grace Hudson Museum & Sun House** in Ukiah is an art, history and anthropology museum housing the lifeworks of artist Grace Carpenter

Hudson as well as an impressive display of Native American Pomo basketry. Just around the corner, the artist cooperative in the **Corner Gallery Ukiah** showcases the works of local artists and is the hub of the **First Friday Ukiah Artwalk**. From 5 to 8pm art walk sites offer opening receptions, music, complimentary refreshments, and the chance to mingle with local artists.

Every summer, the City of Ukiah presents **Sundays in the Park**, a series of six free concerts in tree-shaded Todd Grove



What the Heck is Boontling?

R eportedly first created by women, children, and young men working in the hop fields as a way to entertain themselves (and to keep from being understood by the uninitiated), Boontling or Boont eventually spread.

For a time, it even became the Anderson Valley's principal spoken language. Today, the folk language consists of about 1,000 words and survives mainly through the efforts of the Boontling Club. The club sells a pocket-sized word list at the Historical Museum and local businesses. Here's a brief glossary.

Apple-head: girlfriend

Bahl: good, as in "bahl hornin" (good drinkin')

Baldies: the grassy hills east of Boonville

Bluetail: rattlesnake

Briney: the ocean

Bucky: a nickel

Can-Kicky: angry

Cock a Fister: fight

Deek: look or see

Fratty: wine

Gorm: food, or

to eat

Harp: talk (particularly to speak Boontling)

Heelch: a large quantity or amount

Hoot: laugh

Kimmie: man

Moshe: a machine, particularly a car

Nee: no, not (often attached as a prefix, as in "neemer," not anymore)

Pike: hike or walk

Stook On: stuck on, in love with

Tidrik: a party Zeese: coffee



Park. Performers range from worldfamous names to talented locals.

Founded in 1977, the Ukiah Players **Theatre** presents seasons of high quality classic drama, contemporary plays, comedies, musicals, and even original local works. S.P.A.C.E. Theater is where you can find a panoply of performances, ranging from dance to music to improv.

Just north of Ukiah, Mendocino College stages productions with Ukiah Players Theatre, Ukiah Civic Light Opera, and the Ukiah Symphony Orchestra, which draws from community talent for four annual concerts.

At the workshop and gallery, Graces on Main/Jan Hoyman Studio, you'll find exquisite earthenware platters, bowls, and serving pieces. The selection at Nomad's World encourages you to expand your horizons with its imported handmade objects made by artisans from a variety of Asian cultures. Knitters will want to stop in at Heidi's Yarn Haven for its superb high-end yarns and notions.

Just a few miles south of Willits on Highway 101 is Ridgewood Ranch, known to the world as "The Home of Seabiscuit," the famous thoroughbred racehorse of the 1930s. The Seabiscuit Heritage Foundation holds tours of Seabiscuit's home.

With more than 100,000 artifacts, the Mendocino County Museum in Willits examines the region's diverse history: Pomo Indian culture, railroading, shipping, and logging. It brings history alive too, thanks to rooms set up as an old mercantile, a vintage ice cream shop, and an actual dentist's office. Staffed by volunteers, Roots of Motive Power, next door to the Museum, preserves and restores steam and diesel-powered machinery used in the area's logging industry. The collection includes railroad engines and cars, donkey engines, and cranes.



The Willits Center for the Arts, housed in the restored 1926 Women's Improvement Club building, is dedicated to providing the community and visitors arts and cultural activities. It combines exhibit areas showcasing local artisans' works as well as a venue for performances and music.

The Willits Community Theatre, in its 35th year, provides live theatre year-round with quality plays and special productions. With its own venue, the Willits Shakespeare Company stages an annual production and conducts spring workshops.

Tucked away in Covelo, John Marshall creates exquisite Japanese textiles using age-old techniques. Check his website www.johnmarshall.to for open studio tours and classes.

Anderson Valley

A true Boonville treasure, Tom McFadden Furniture's exquisite handcrafted pieces reflect influences ranging from Art Nouveau to Shaker design and the Arts and Crafts movement.

A mile north of Boonville, the **Anderson** Vallev Historical Museum is housed in an iconic one-room schoolhouse.

Exhibits range from indigenous Pomo baskets to vintage farm equipment. You can also learn about Boontling, the language invented by locals in the 19th century and still in limited use today. Hours vary, so call ahead.

In Philo, **The Pot Shop** is a working studio and gallery where visitors can see the pottery creation process from throwing clay on a potter's wheel to unloading pots from the kiln.

The Coast

Gualala

With galleries showcasing photography, jewelry, ceramics, and painting, Gualala is a true arts haven with a long creative tradition.

The community is home to the Gualala **Arts Center**, a superb cultural facility that hosts art exhibitions, performances, and community events. Set among towering redwoods, the center is an impressive arts venue. On its grounds, you'll find sculptures, gardens, and a walking trail.

The Cypress Village Gallery District is an ideal stop thanks to the creative talent housed there. Henley's Art & Interiors carries unique fine art and handcrafted

items. The award-winning Studio 391 Fine Art Gallery has a diverse selection that includes photography, painting, sculpture, and ceramics. Curated by modern design pioneers Lu Wendel and Maynard Hale Lyndon, Placewares focuses on design and art for the home. Spindrift Gallery concentrates on paintings by owner Craig Gilliland, as well as leading Northern California artists.

Elsewhere in town, Alinder Gallery is a must for Ansel Adams devotees. The gallery's husband-and-wife owners, James and Mary Street Alinder, are worldrenowned Adams authorities. Downtown's **Dolphin Gallery** is the retail annex of the Gualala Arts Center and exhibits everything from photography and paintings to ceramics, forged metal, baskets, and birdhouses. Located in a distinctive setting above town, **Stewart Kummer Gallery** features fine arts and crafts by Northern California artists working in a variety of media.

Point Arena

Thirty buildings in Point Arena along Highway 1 comprise an historical district listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Downtown includes

shops, galleries, cafés, and Main Street's historic **Arena Theater**. The theater first opened in 1929 as a vaudeville venue and was lovingly restored in 1997. It now shows first-run films and presents live concerts and other performances.

Lighthouse buffs need no introduction to Point Arena. Standing on a beautiful peninsula that juts into the Pacific, 115-foot-tall **Point Arena Lighthouse** underwent a major restoration and offers an evocative look at area history.

At Point Arena **Tileworks**, artist and craftsman Matt Matijczyk fires all of his pieces on site. He takes pride in the high quality, durability, and affordability of his creations, as well as his rare fused glass tiles.

Elk

The Artist's Collective showcases the work of 28 artists from Fort Bragg to Sea Ranch. Works include photography, paintings, ceramics, pottery, and redwood furniture.

The building that houses Elk's **Greenwood State Beach Visitor Center & Museum**served as the mill office for two lumber
companies and later as town post office.
Historic photographs and artifacts
(including a vintage organ) bring town
history alive, and a wall-sized mural depicts
the unusual wharf that once operated here.





Mendocino

Art is central to life in the Village of Mendocino. Year round, you'll likely see a dozen or more plein-air painters working at easels around town, as well as photographers attempting to capture the village's subtle beauty and changing moods.

The village is full of galleries with innovative works that venture far beyond traditional seascapes. A monthly celebration of art takes place in Mendocino on the second Saturday of the month. From 5 to 8pm, galleries hold openings, and shops stay open later than usual.

With gardens and grounds ideal for contemplation, the Mendocino Art Center showcases a different local talent each month and offers a varied slate of classes—from ceramics to digital arts. Upstairs in the Sussex Building on Main Street, Artists' Co-Op of Mendocino is a destination for art collectors and connoisseurs, known for quality traditional and contemporary art that is diverse in content, style, and medium. The deck offers an unparalleled bay view.

Ocean Quilts carries an impressive selection of locally crafted quilts, folk art, and table linens. There is nothing like a cool ocean breeze to inspire a knitter to start a new project and the Mendocino Yarn Shop is a must-stop for aficionados, thanks to its fine yarns and helpful staff.

The **Highlight Gallery** on Main Street showcases over 200 regional and nationally known American artists and craftspeople. Artist Linda Brown shows her original designs in glass at the **Color & Light Glass Studio**.

If you love jewelry, you're bound to be tempted by the offerings in Mendocino. Pearls of Wisdom Design channels the energy of gardens, plants and nature in exquisitely detailed and delicate jewelry. Rubaiyat Beads has a sister shop in Fort Bragg, and also sells imported rugs. The high-quality and affordable jewelry at Mendocino Sandpiper makes it a popular stop while Panache's two village locations beautifully display jewelry, sculpture, art glass, and museum quality paintings.

The wares at **Compass Rose Leather** include not just handcrafted leather goods but also glassware and fine woodworking.

Offering a vivid timeline of Mendocino and the surrounding region, the **Ford House Museum** displays photographs, logging equipment, Pomo artifacts, and a model of the village circa 1890. Built in 1854, the house was home to Jerome Ford, one of the men originally dispatched to salvage cargo from the shipwreck *Frolic*.

The 1861 Kelley House Museum showcases exhibits on Mendocino coastal history. Mendocino was unique among 19th-century California's coastal settlements because of its large Chinese community. The village's historic Chinatown burned down in 1910 but the surviving Temple of Kwan Tai is believed to be the oldest Chinese joss house in rural California. Restored in 2001, the temple is a registered State Historic Landmark and preserves the history of the county's Chinese immigrants.

Symphony of the Redwoods features 50 amateur and professional musicians from Mendocino and surrounding counties. From September to May, it stages concerts in Mendocino and Fort Bragg.

For three decades, the **Mendocino Theatre Company** has presented everything from classic drama to children's theater. Plays are staged in the intimate 76-seat Helen Schoeni Theatre on the Mendocino Art Center's grounds.

Fort Bragg

With gallery openings, street theater, and concerts in coffee houses, Fort Bragg's First Fridays are an exciting and accessible introduction to local arts and culture. Stop by the Visit Mendocino County Marketplace to say hello, take in the new artwork, and shop for local products.


There's plenty of art to go around in Fort Bragg! A member of the fair-trade federation, **Ananse Village** works directly with village artisans in Africa and displays baskets, beads, masks, and textiles in its showroom. A cooperative of several Mendocino coast artists, **Partners Gallery** exhibits contemporary painting, photography, jewelry, and sculpture, and also presents events including poetry readings, concerts, lectures, and films. **Edgewater Gallery** features locally

created fine art including watercolors, oils, acrylics, photography, ceramics, fine woodwork, jewelry, mixed media, hand painted scarves, and sculpture.

Mendocino Coast Photographer Guild and Gallery is devoted to inspiring photographic excellence on the Northern California coast. Built by artist Buster Dyer and his wife Trish, Glass Fire Art Glass Gallery displays distinctive chandeliers, including works shaped like jellyfish.

Overlooking the surf from a knoll in downtown Fort Bragg, the **Guest House Museum** is located in a spectacular threestory 1892 Victorian. Photographs, maps, and artifacts illustrate Fort Bragg history. An assortment of machinery, including log-hauling donkey engines and train locomotives, surround the house.

Gloriana Musical Theater produces a wide variety of theatrical offerings throughout the year while **Opera Fresca** presents top-quality opera, concerts, and cabaret in both Mendocino and Fort Bragg.







Art, Music & More Festivals!

April

Sonoma Mendocino Whale and Jazz Festival: Enjoy a month-long festival of concerts, theater, poetry, and dining at venues throughout the South Coast.

Anderson Valley Open Studios: Your chance to tour the studios of local artists.

May

Gualala Fine Arts Fair: Browse the art, watch craft demonstrations, and enjoy the entertainment at this intimate two-day arts festival in the small coastal town of Gualala.

June

Mendocino Film Festival: Held in locations throughout the county, the Film Festival brings filmmakers and independent movies for special screenings, talks, and other events.

Kate Wolf Music Festival: A musical institution in the county, this three-day music festival features a line-up of top musical talent at Black Oak Ranch in Laytonville.

Sierra Nevada World Music Festival: In Boonville, experience world music and the summer solstice in this three-day celebration of peace, unity and brotherhood.

July

Mendocino Music Festival: Held in one of the most enchanting sites in Northern California, this respected music festival features classical, opera, blues, and world music performances.

August

Art in the Gardens: The best garden party on the coast is held annually at the gorgeous Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens.

Mendocino Coast Writers' Conference: Writers discover encouragement, expertise and inspiration from leading authors and publishing professionals.

Willits Kinetic Carnivale: An amazing array of activities for aficionados of kinetic energy & steam power with a fair, a grand ball, handcar races, and a symphony of steam engines.

September

Studio Discovery Tour: This free, selfguided tour spans a 60-mile stretch of Mendocino Coast, allowing visitors a peek into the personal studios of more than 40 of the county's talented, unique artists.

October

Day of the Dead Festival: Learn to make altars, flowers, jewelry, sugar skulls and other Day of the Dead traditions. Enjoy pan de muerto and Mexican hot cocoa, then follow the Altar Trail.

November

Thanksgiving Arts & Crafts Fair: A holiday marketplace with unique, high quality artwork and gift items, glass works, fiber wearables, jewelry, ceramics, paintings, photography, and much more.

Festival of Trees: Gualala Arts Center is transformed into a 19th century mill town, serving guests hearty vittles and libations, including local scrumpy, a Gingerbread House Contest, and a magical "Fairytale Forest."

land of many terrains, Mendocino County is the ideal destination for the adventurous traveler looking to explore by land and sea in a single trip. From hiking and cycling to surfing, diving, boating, and everything in between, there's no shortage of adventure opportunities in the great outdoors.

The Pacific coastline and the pristine headwaters of the county's rivers lure canoeists and kayakers for lazy floats and more adrenaline-fueled outings in stretches of whitewater and ocean. Mountain bike riders and hikers heed the call of the redwood forests with their myriad trails and leafy landscapes.

So however you like to enjoy the great outdoors, Mendocino County has the resources. We dare you: just try to resist our waves and wilderness!

Redwood Corridor

West of Ukiah, **Montgomery Woods State Natural Reserve** is home to five groves of old growth redwoods. Meander along the miles of trails that take you into 2,700 acres of unspoiled forest.

Boat, hike, camp, picnic or fish for largemouth bass and catfish on beautiful **Lake Mendocino**, located just a few miles from Ukiah near the headwaters of the Russian River. The lake has 300

campsites, playgrounds, hiking and horseback trails, disc golf, and a marina.

With over 31 miles of streams and 12 wildlife reservoirs, the rugged terrain of **Cow Mountain** offers a variety of recreational activities, from off-roading to camping, hiking and cycling. For a great view of the Ukiah Valley, drive out to **Low Gap Park** and hike up the **City View Trail**. The two-mile loop trail climbs the hill for some great views. Combine with the **Canyon Trail** for a four-plus mile walk.



Just north of Leggett, **Smithe Redwoods State Natural Reserve** showcases
redwoods in its Frank and Bess Smithe
Grove. Fish and swim in the south fork
of the **Eel River** and splash in the 60foot waterfall. The 200-mile stretch of
the Eel is perfect for rafting or hunting
out swimming holes. Rent equipment
or take a guided trip through **Rubicon Whitewater Adventures**.

With trails threading the area, **Round** Valley is ideal for riders of dirt bikes, ATVs, and other motorized off-road vehicles. Black Butte River Ranch provides horse boarding, paddocks, and pasture (in addition to a store and campsites). Horses are also welcome in the **Mendocino National Forest**, a few miles farther east.

Anderson Valley

Anderson Valley is home to three beautiful old-growth redwood reserves. Turn off Highway 128 between Yorkville and Boonville on to Fish Rock Road and you'll arrive at Mailliard Redwoods State Natural Reserve. Don't expect a lot of action—just majestic trees and

solitude. Just beyond Philo, turn west on Philo-Greenwood Road to **Hendy Woods**. Camping, swimming in the Navarro River, hiking, kayaking and canoeing are just some of the outdoor activities you can indulge in. Try for fish in the Navarro River watershed down river from the bridge at the park entrance.

Enjoy similar activities ten miles beyond Philo at **Navarro River Redwoods State Park**. The drive through the park along Highway 128 is has been described as "an 11-mile long redwood tunnel to the sea."

Deep in the woods at **Camp Navarro**, enjoy night games such as glowing badminton, ping-pong and glow light toss. Family and group games include volleyball, soccer, bocce and for the more adventurous, archery and rock climbing.

The Coast

Gualala is a haven for outdoor adventure. Fishing is permitted in the ocean and in many area streams and rivers but restrictions apply, so check with local authorities.

While many visitors come here for ocean kayaking, you can also paddle along the

Gualala River with Adventure Rents. Anchor Bay is a popular gateway to Schooner Gulch State Beach and its forested gulch and bluff-top views, as well as Bowling Ball Beach—named for wave-rounded boulders that look like, well, bowling balls!

Arena Cove in the town of Point Arena is home to one of the state's best fishing piers, which stands about 25 feet above the water. The harbor is also a popular spot for surfers. The Arena Rock Underwater Preserve offers abundant marine life and even a sunken wreck. Activities such as kayaking, diving, snorkeling, and swimming are allowed unless otherwise noted.

The **Point Arena-Stornetta Public Lands** has 1,665 acres of coastline, estuary, and beach, and contains significant natural resources and wildlife. The area is ideal for daytime activities such as hiking, picnicking, wildlife watching, and soaking up the views of Mendocino's breathtaking South Coast. Climb the **Point Arena Lighthouse**, the only lighthouse on the Pacific offering access to the top!

Manchester State Beach is one of the longest stretches of sandy beach in California and is great for fishing and witnessing impressive collections of giant driftwood logs. Horseback riding is a great way to explore this area and Ross Ranch leads guided rides along beaches or into mountain redwood forests.

Enjoy kayaking down **Noyo River**, or through the caves and crevices of the Pacific coast. **Big River**, Northern California's largest undeveloped estuary, sitting along 7,334 acres of wetlands and forest, is also ideal for watersports. For a different kind of beauty, head inland on Little River Airport Road to the world-famous **Pygmy Forest**. The forest's fully mature pine and cypress trees (some a century old) range in height from just six inches to eight feet. Hike or bike the 10 miles of trails lush with ferns in the river canyon.

A classic coastal stretch, **Mendocino Headlands State Park** contains two miles of sea cliffs, tide pools, and offers outstanding views of the Village of Mendocino.



Mendocino National Forest

ying along the county's north-Leastern edge, spectacular Mendocino National Forest stretches 65 miles long and 35 miles across. It comprises almost a million acres of California's Coast Range and spreads into five counties.

This vast expanse of wooded mountains, canyons, rivers, mountain lakes, and wilderness offers camping, hiking, backpacking, fishing, and hunting. Miles of trails wind through terrain that ranges in elevation from about 3,000 to more than 8,000 feet. The forest is perhaps most easily accessible from Covelo on Mendocino Pass Road.

At the national forest's northern end, the sprawling and extremely remote Yolla Bolly Middle Eel Wilderness is fascinating and challenging to explore, thanks to its creeks, waterfalls, and indigenous plants and wildlife. An excursion into this area along the Eel River demands planning and outdoor skills. Be sure you have the ability to deal with its rugged country.







The Lost Coast

This spectacular wilderness, which hugs the northern Mendocino coast, begins just north of Rockport where Highway 1 swings inland and leaves the Pacific.

Straddling the Mendocino and Humboldt county lines, this 80-mile stretch of coastline includes the Sinkyone Wilderness State Park and the King Range National Conservation Area. It's a ruggedly beautiful and unspoiled landscape with trails, campsites and scenic spots. Pristine **Usal Beach**—a surfer's and kayaker's paradise—is accessible by an unpaved road a few miles inland from the coast. Although spectacular, the area is challenging and can be treacherous, so proper planning is essential. Mendocino Insider Tours offers day-trips, sparing you the headache of renting a four-wheel drive vehicle. An amazing way to see the area is with Air Galore, based at the Little River Airport, which has short flights to both the Lost Coast and south to Point Arena.

The Mendocino Coast Botanical

Gardens is a coastal treasure. Trails wind through 47 breathtaking acres of gardens, native forests, and wildflowers. Some of its rhododendrons are more than 20 feet tall. One surprise here is the Cliff House. Out on the last curve of the Coastal Bluff Trail, the wooden shelter overlooks the tidal action in a tiny cove.

Liquid Fusion Kayaking's tours explore coastal areas, focus on bird watching and wildlife, and reveal local history in Noyo Harbor and along the Noyo River.

A former city landfill, **Glass Beach** is one of California's most unusual beaches. Years of pounding wave action broke down bottles and deposited tons of polished glass onto the beach.

Redwood groves are a popular Fort Bragg attraction. Right in town, Otis R. Johnson Wilderness Park features trails through the towering trees. A onetime lumber-company throughway, the Old Haul Road starts at Pudding Creek right behind the Beachcomber Motel, then runs 10 miles north to Ten Mile River in MacKerricher State Park. Much of the road is paved and it's a great route for hikes or bike rides from Fort Bragg to the park. Along the way, it passes Lake Cleone, the snowy plover habitat at Virgin Creek, the Laguna Point sea lion rookery, and the Ten Mile Dunes.

Just east of Fort Bragg, 50,000-acre **Jackson State Forest** boasts groves of old-growth redwoods, as well as interpretive walks and miles of trails. With both single- and double-track routes for cyclists of all levels, it's a haven for mountain bikers.

The tiny town of Cleone serves as a gate-way to MacKerricher State Park, which occupies land that was once part of the Mendocino Indian Reservation. Wildlife spotters come here to look for whales, harbor seals, and dozens of bird species. You can also enjoy two freshwater fishing lakes, campsites, hiking trails, and a long walkable beach. Bicycling and horseback riding are also popular activities.



Outdoor Activity Resources

Hiking

From quick leg-stretchers to challenging multiday excursions into designated wilderness, Mendocino County's hiking rivals any in California. You'll discover old-growth redwoods and fern canyons, ocean cliffs, and secluded beaches. Scenery ranges from ocean-view mountain slopes along the Lost Coast to high-mountain forests in the inland valley.



On The Water

Along the coast, **Adventure Rents** in Gualala rents canoes and kayaks for trips on the Gualala River and leads summer moonlight "flotillas" with catered beach dinners. **Force 10 Ocean Kayak Tours** in Elk offers two-hour trips along the coastline in two-person kayaks. For more ocean adventure, **Kayak Mendocino** leads sea cave tours from the beach in Van Damme State Park.


Operating on Big River, Catch-a-Canoe rents canoes and kayaks and leads guided tours in custom-built outrigger canoes. In Fort Bragg, Liquid Fusion Kayaking heads out on coastline tours, as well as Noyo Harbor and Noyo River outings. Whether you're a beginner or expert, Rubicon Whitewater Adventures offers river-rafting experiences throughout the county.

Noyo Harbor is the go-to spot for whale watching, crabbing and deep sea fishing. Depending on the season—and the seas—take a cruise with **All Aboard Adventures** or **Noyo Fishing Center**. Paddle boarding is another way to navigate the waters of the coast. **Stand Up Paddle Mendocino** offers tours of coastal coves, caves and rivers.

Horseback Riding

For equestrians, few pleasures can compare to splashing through the surf along a Mendocino beach. You can also ride into the mountains, through forests, and across coastal plains. On



the South Coast, **Ross Ranch** offers rides on Manchester Beach and in the redwoods east of Elk. A hidden treasure north of Fort Bragg, **Ricochet Ridge Ranch** offers horseback riding, including trips along the beach—the only place to run a horse on a beach on the West Coast. Outings range from one-hour and half-day guided trail rides to customized excursions. *Outside* magazine declared the ranch's weeklong vacation ride one of the "Top 25 Trips of a Lifetime."

Golf

Mendocino County offers golf courses that range from unique and challenging to breathtaking.

At the north end of Willits, the beautiful nine-hole **Brooktrails Golf Course** winds among towering redwoods and rustling creeks.

The only golf course on the Mendocino Coast at the **Little River Inn** offers a surprisingly challenging layout along hills and redwoods. The nine-hole facility has ocean views and is an Audubon Society-certified sanctuary.

Blending natural beauty and a challenging layout, the classic **Ukiah Valley Golf Course** has ranked among Northern California's best public golf venues since its opening in 1931.

Camping

Mendocino County offers dozens of public and private campgrounds. Highlights include Paul M. Dimmick Campground in Navarro River Redwoods State Park along Highway 128, which has a waterfall trail; Van Damme State Park, which snakes back from the coast through Fern Canyon; north of Fort Bragg at MacKerricher State Park, and at Lake Mendocino just north of Ukiah.




Q oth mountain bikers and Droad cyclists will find that Mendocino County delivers a range of experiences that will inspire them to saddle up every day they're here.

his is just the place to nix the screen time and get the family outside for hikes, bike rides, train rides, kayaking, and beach adventures. No need to leave the grandparents behind: bring everyone! And that means your pets too. The family dog is welcome to accompany you on all sorts of adventures (and into many businesses) in the county.

Here's a quick look at top family destinations and activities in Mendocino County.

Outdoor Adventures


Take a trip on the world famous **Skunk Train**, which departs from both Fort Bragg and Willits, and meanders through majestic redwood forests. During the holidays, parents and little ones will love the Christmas Skunk Train ride, featuring music, hot chocolate, cookies, and a visit with Santa.

Explore the rivers and oceans with a kayak trip through the sea caves at Van Damme State Park, bring Fido along on an outrigger canoe up Big River, or drift up the gentle Noyo River for wildlife viewing.

Hit the trails at the **Point Arena- Stornetta National Monument** with its

dramatic geology and coastline. While you're on the south coast, Gualala Point County Park has a variety of terrains ranging from beaches to coastal prairies and forests. Travel to the Pygmy Forest across five marine terraces and 500,000 years at Jug Handle State Natural Reserve or hike the Fern Canyon trail at Van Damme State Park. Montgomery Woods State Natural Reserve has a criss-cross of trails set among the giant redwoods. Or go tide-pooling and bird watching at Spring Ranch Preserve.

Have a whale of time watching the harbor seals and sea lions frolic in **Noyo Harbor** or spy passing whales from any clifftop location—spring and fall bring the gray whale migrations!





Enjoy the wacky July 4 parade in Mendocino; fireworks and fun at Todd Point Park in Fort Bragg, and hit rodeo central at Willits Frontier Days.

August

Experience all the fun of the fair with rides, carnival games, and sideshows at the Redwood Empire Fair in Ukiah. Lumberjacks, an ugly dog contest, firemen's water fight and more are featured at the annual Paul Bunyan Days in Fort Bragg!

September

The Mendocino County Fair & Apple Show in Boonville is a fun country fair with animals, rides, music and more.

October 1

Smashing Pumpkins...? Yes, at Ukiah's PumpkinFest with its scarecrow contest, pumpkin smashing, booths and a parade.

December

The Festival of Lights in Fort Braga brings a winter wonderland of lights throughout the Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens.



Go fish at Lake Mendocino or launch a whale or crabbing excursion from Noyo Harbor.

Everyone, including Fido, will enjoy the Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens. a floral wonderland in any season. Saddle up at Ricochet Ridge Ranch and take a guided horseback ride on the beach and through the forest trails.

Mesmerizing **Glass Beach** in Fort Bragg is one of the most distinctive beaches on the West Coast, if not the world. This former city dumpsite was transformed by crashing waves into a sea glass-covered wonderland.

For over a decade, B. Bryan Preserve in Point Arena has been actively committed to the breeding and preservation of endangered African hoof stock. Today, children and parents alike can watch zebra, giraffes, and antelope freely roam in a natural environment.

At Hopland's Solar Living Center, generate some electricity, get hands on with the interactive exhibits and enjoy a picnic by the pond.

Family-Fun Classics

Putter around the course at Emerald **Dolphin Mini Golf** or throw a round of disc golf at courses throughout the county. Bowl everyone over at Yokayo Bowling **Center** in Ukiah, a family favorite.

The home of "Mystery, Fun, and Family Entertainment," Confusion Hill features the world-famous Gravity House, Redwood Shoe House, the world's largest free standing redwood chainsaw carving, and a unique miniature Mountain Train Ride. On your way, take a detour through the Chandelier Drive-Thru Tree.

Shopping

Mendocino County is a family shopping paradise. Village Toy Store in Mendocino specializes in old-fashioned toys such as wooden blocks, Raggedy Ann dolls, Lincoln Logs, and the largest inventory of kites north of San Francisco. For the readers in the family, **Gallery** Bookshop & Bookwinkle's Children's **Books** in Mendocino and **Mendocino** Book Company in Ukiah offer the chance to unplug in comfortable silence while turning the pages of a favorite book. 

For larger gatherings, consider the Little River Inn with its fullservice spa on-site and ocean-view location.

The Stanford Inn offers a full range of planning resources and ceremony locations including a gorgeous herb garden and in front of the lobby fireplace. Owner Jeff Stanford can even officiate! Elk Cove Inn with its oceanfront gazebo and picturesque views is also a treasured wedding venue.



Getting to Mendocino County

By Air

The nearest international airports to Mendocino County are Oakland International (OAK), which is about 2-3 hours away by car depending on your final destination; San Francisco International (SFO), 2.5-3.5 hours away; and Sacramento International (SMF), about 2-3 hours away.

The closest airport offering scheduled commercial air service is the Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport. It's located in Santa Rosa, about 55 miles (89 km) and an hour's drive south of Ukiah and 94 miles (151 km) and two hours' drive southeast of the Village of Mendocino.

Major car rental agencies are located at each airport.

Visitors with their own planes or access to private small-plane charters will find the county rich in convenient landing options.

Bv Car

Mendocino County is most easily reached by car. California 1 runs along all but a few miles of the county's coastline and connects Mendocino with San Francisco and, eventually, Southern California on one of the world's most spectacular driving routes. U.S. 101 neatly bisects the county. It travels north from Southern California and San Francisco, passes through Santa Rosa, and then links Hopland, Ukiah, and Willits along another beautiful (and easily drivable) route. It continues into Oregon and Washington and you can connect to Interstate 5 and reach Portland and Seattle.

By Bus

Greyhound provides long-distance commercial bus service from points all across North America. In Mendocino County, it stops in Willits and Ukiah. Buses serve the county from Sonoma County Airport in Santa Rosa (see below).

Getting Around Mendocino County

By Bus

Providing public transit services to an area as vast and mostly rural as Mendocino County is a formidable challenge. But the Mendocino Transit Authority (MTA) has operated public transportation in the county for more than 30 years. MTA serves an area of nearly 3,000 square miles.

MTA's services encompass a combination of 12 long-distance, commuter, and local routes. There are also three semi-custom Dial-a-Ride or flexible routes.

The coast is especially well served and routes connect the coastal towns and virtually all of the primary visitor attractions there. And Fort Bragg enjoys extensive local service. Buses also connect the coast with Ukiah and Willits, the principal cities of the inland valleys, and also have their own local routes. Most buses run hourly, and service is generally available from about 7am until about 6:30pm

Two MTA routes (including an express bus) connect Mendocino County with the Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport and the city of Santa Rosa. From the airport, connections are available on the Sonoma County Airport Express for service to and from San Francisco and Oakland international airports. From Santa Rosa, you can connect with Sonoma County Transit, Santa Rosa City Bus, AMTRAK, and Golden Gate Transit (for service south to Marin and San Francisco Counties).

By Car

Driving is the most convenient and efficient way to explore the county (especially through the wine country valleys, in more remote areas, and if you're planning on camping, backpacking, or hiking).

For taxi service, Hey Taxi! operates in the county; heytaxiinc.com or 707.467.1200 or 707.459.2040.

Car rentals are available at Enterprise Rent-A-Car or Hertz at Sport Chrysler in Fort Bragg, and in Ukiah at Enterprise Rent-A-Car or Hertz.

Wine Tasting Tips

Designate a driver. Driving can be challenging on narrow, winding roads, and California strictly enforces a legal blood alcohol limit of .08.

A number of companies offer tasting tours for a safe and enjoyable way to visit wineries and enjoy the scenery. Tour Mendocino Wines (tourmendocinowines. com) conducts private guided outings to county wineries, Anderson Valley Wine Tour (andersonvalleywinetour.com) and Mendocino Wine Tours (mendocinowine-tours.com) takes visitors on guided trips to a variety of locations with doorto-door van service from your inn. Mendo Wine Tours (mendocinowinetours.com) offers daily tours with chauffeured service and gourmet lunches.

Sample responsibly. Tasting rooms will not serve anyone who appears to be intoxicated (it's against the law to do so).

Plan (and call) ahead. This is a great way to confirm hours and find out about special events. Or even arrange a private tour (these are not offered as a matter of course at most of our wineries but are great experiences).

Ask the winemaker. Experience wine country as it is meant to be experienced. Take advantage of the intimate tasting rooms hosted by owners, winemakers, and family members.




